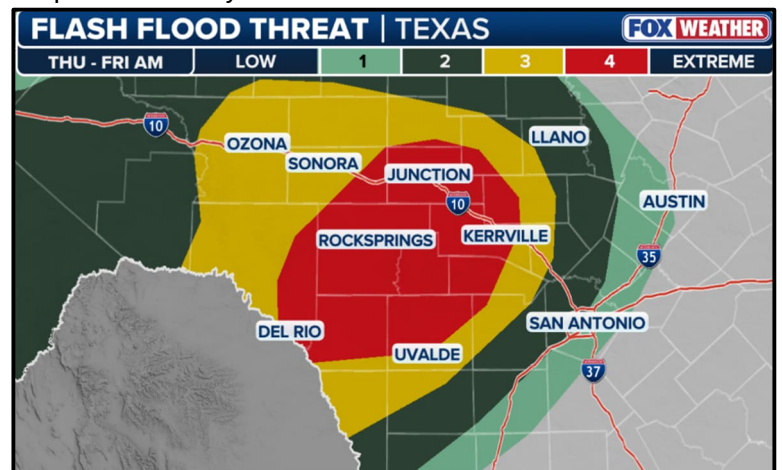
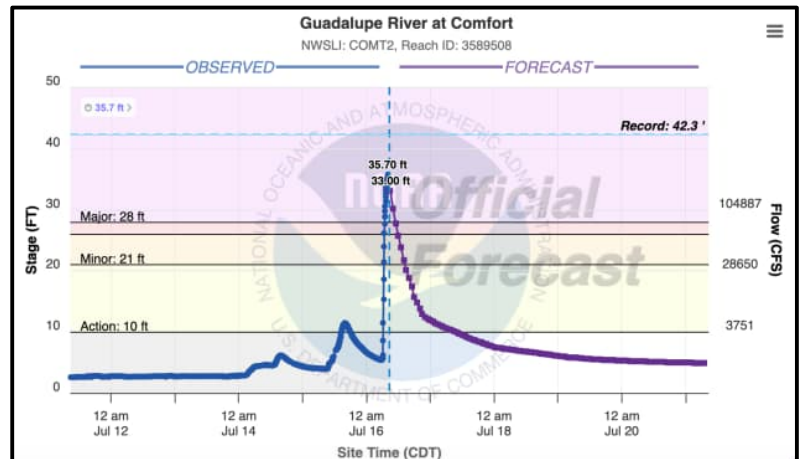
WSP USA FIELD SERVICES DISASTER AWARENESS REPORT

July 16, 2026

Flood Activity

Texas

- Relentless, life-threatening flash flooding is ongoing across parts of Texas' Hill Country and Big Bend regions as the National Weather Service (NWS) warned of a "large and deadly flood wave" moving down the Guadalupe River early Thursday.
- "The river gauge at Center Point has risen 32 feet in 4 hours and is expected to reach a crest similar to [the] July 4, 2025, catastrophic river flood," the NWS said in a Flash Flood Emergency warning bulletin issued just after 5:30 a.m. local time.
- Flash Flood Emergencies were issued in the pre-dawn hours Thursday across Kerr, Kendall and Uvalde counties after intense rain rates sent rivers and creeks surging toward major flood stage.
- South-central Texas has been battered by heavy rain since Monday night, with more than 2.5 million people in the bull's-eye for additional rounds of torrential rain through Friday.
- The Guadalupe River at Hunt rose more than 10 feet in just one hour.
- More than 20 inches of rain has fallen in Uvalde over the past 3 days, and police were seen going door to door Wednesday morning. Uvalde police said they have conducted at least 25 water rescues since Tuesday.
- Meanwhile, the same weather system responsible for the flooding spawned a radar-confirmed tornado in northwest San Antonio that damaged a popular shopping mall during the Wednesday morning rush.
- NOAA's Weather Prediction Center (WPC) increased Thursday's flood risk to a Level 4 out of 4 flash flood risk for parts of the Texas Hill Country, with a broader Level 3 threat including the rest of Hill Country.
- A Level 2 threat covers the northwestern part of the San Antonio metro area through Friday morning.
- The region is forecast to see an additional 2 to 5 inches of rain through Friday.
- Flood Watches for life-threatening floods remain in place across central and southwestern Texas, including Austin, Kerrville and Del Rio through Thursday.



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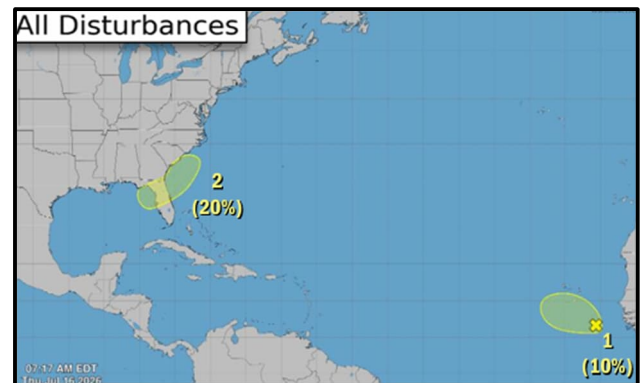
Missouri

- Southeast Missourians are working to recover from severe flash flooding that hit the region late last week.
- The Black River hit record crests, rising to more than 28 feet.
- Reynolds, Iron and Crawford counties faced the most significant flooding. Gov. Mike Kehoe issued a state of emergency Friday.
- One of the largest rescue operations occurred near Lesterville in southeast Missouri, where the Missouri National Guard airlifted 202 campers and counselors from a summer camp that became surrounded by rising floodwaters overnight Friday into Saturday.
- The flooding also turned deadly. The Crawford County Sheriff's Department said a woman who went missing during flash flooding was found dead Saturday about 1.8 miles downstream from her home.
- State officials continue to monitor conditions and assess whether federal disaster assistance will be needed as recovery efforts continue.

Tropical Activity – Atlantic

Disturbance 1

- Located SE of the Cabo Verde Islands moving WNW at 10 mph.
- Slow development of this system is possible over the next couple of days.
- Forecast to move into a less conducive environment by this weekend.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (10%); 7-day: Low (10%)



Disturbance 2

- Located over the northeastern Gulf of America moving NE.
- Slow development of this system is possible.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Low (20%)

Tropical Activity – Pacific

Tropical Storm Elida

- Located approximately 660 miles SW of southern tip of Baja California moving W at 12 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds of 60 mph.
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 125 miles from center.
- Additional strengthening is forecast during the next couple of days, and Elida is expected to become a hurricane Thursday night or early Friday before reaching its peak intensity on Friday.

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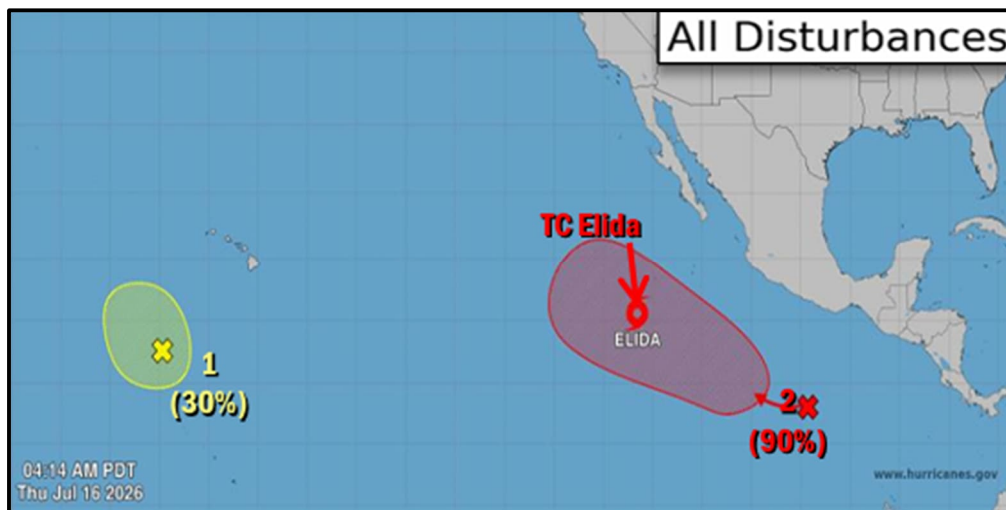
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Disturbance 1

- Located several hundred miles SW of the Hawaiian Islands moving NW.
- Tropical depression could form by Friday.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (30%); 7-day: Low (30%)

Disturbance 2

- Located several hundred miles SSW of the coast of southern Mexico moving WNW.
- Tropical depression is likely to form by this weekend into early next week.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (10%); 7-day: High (90%)
