

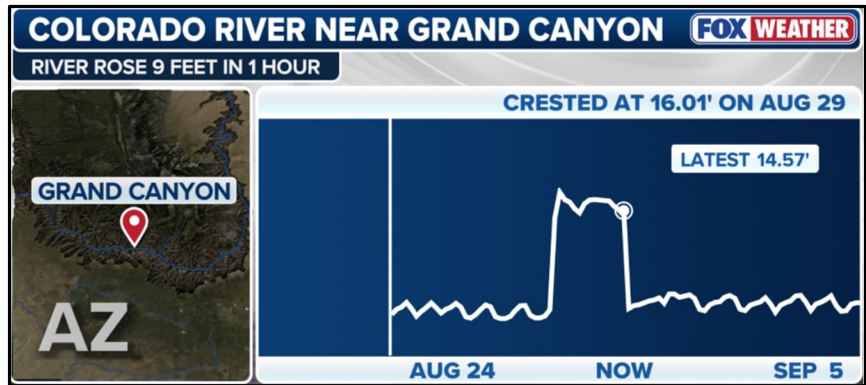

WSP USA FIELD SERVICES DISASTER AWARENESS REPORT

August 31, 2026

Flash Flooding Activity Arizona

- One person has died, roughly 15 people are missing and dozens more needed to be airlifted to safety as sudden flash slammed Grand Canyon National Park Saturday afternoon.
- Park officials said flooding began in Bright Angel Canyon around 2:30 p.m., and the National Park Service had to evacuate 62 individuals by air from the Phantom Ranch camping area and the lower North Kaibab Trail.
- Officials said more people were evacuated Sunday morning from Cottonwood Campground and Phantom Ranch amid the "significant" flash flood event.
- The flooding caused extensive damage to infrastructure in the inner canyon, including the Transcanyon Waterline, which supplies water from the canyon for use in the park.
- The National Park Service said the waterline is currently not operational, and Stage 4 water restrictions will go into effect on the South Rim at noon on Monday.
- The FOX Forecast Center said that while rain totals only reached 1 to 1.75 inches for the hardest-hit areas, that was enough to cause significant issues in part of the park.
- Gauges along the Colorado River spiked by as much as 9 feet as the rain began to flow through the canyon.
- Additional thunderstorms and heavy rain are possible on Monday, which could result in more flash flooding, debris flows, rockfall and changing trail and river conditions, the National Park Service warned.
- The greatest concern will again be flash flooding. A Level 3 out of 4 flash flood threat has been introduced for a larger portion of Utah. A Level 2 out of 4 threat exists once again for northern Arizona.
- Rain rates over an inch per hour will be possible in the strongest storms, and areas that received heavy rain over the weekend will be especially vulnerable.
- Flood Watches remain in effect until at least Monday evening.



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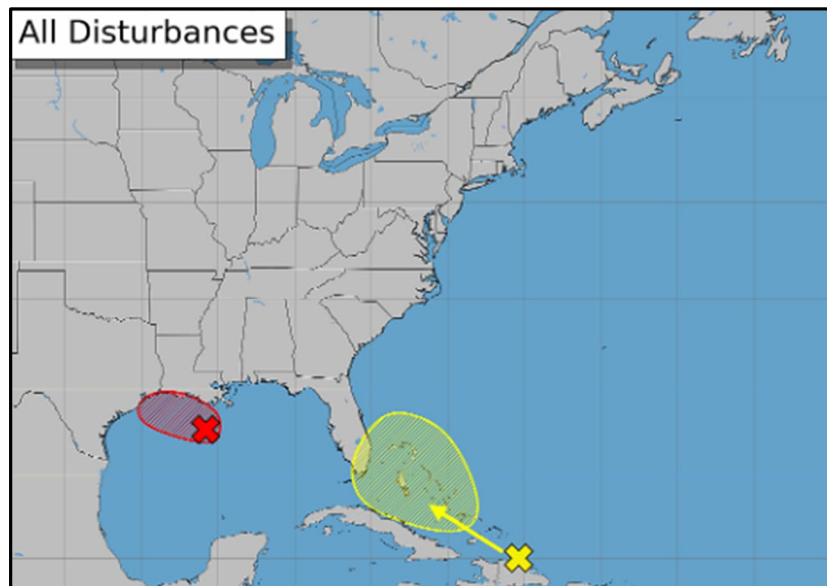
Tropical Activity – Atlantic

Disturbance 1

- Located a little more than 100 miles south of the coast of southern Louisiana producing a small but concentrated area of showers and thunderstorms.
- Additional development is expected as the low moves slowly WNW, and a short lived tropical depression or tropical storm is likely to form before the system reaches the Upper Texas or SW Louisiana coasts on Tuesday.
- Interests along the SW Louisiana and Upper Texas coast should monitor the progress of this system.
- Tropical storm watches or warnings could be required for portions of the area later today.
- This system is expected to bring locally heavy rainfall to portions of the Upper Texas and SW Louisiana coasts during the next couple of days.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: High (70%); 7-day: High (70%)

Remnants of Tropical Storm Dolly

- This system is producing disorganized showers and thunderstorms that extends from near Hispaniola eastward to the northern Leeward Islands.
- Moving quickly WNW at 20 to 25 mph.
- The system could bring locally heavy rains and gusty winds to portions of the Leeward Islands, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Hispaniola, and the Bahamas during the next couple of days.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Low (10%)



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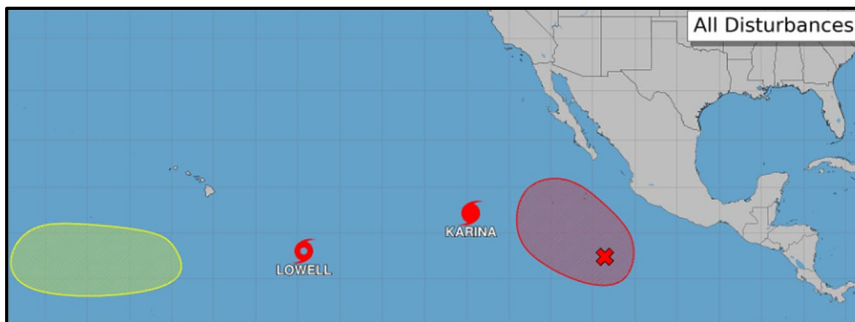
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Tropical Activity – Eastern & Central Pacific

Tropical Storm Lowell

- Located 855 miles ESE of Hilo Hawaii.
- Maximum sustained winds of 60 mph.
- Lowell is moving toward the west near 12 mph, and a general westward motion is expected during the next two to three days.
- Thereafter, a gradual turn toward the west-northwest is forecast.
- Gradual strengthening is expected during the next few days, and Lowell could become a hurricane by Monday night or Tuesday.



Disturbance 1

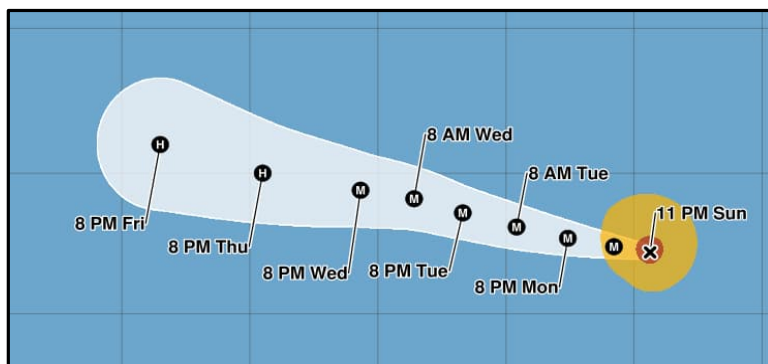
- Showers and thunderstorms are showing signs of organization in association with a broad area of low pressure located several hundred miles south-southwest of the coast of SW Mexico.
- Conditions are conducive for development, and a tropical depression or tropical storm is expected to form later today or tonight.
- Moving NW at around 10 mph.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: High (90%); 7-day: High (90%)

Disturbance 2

- An area of low pressure could form well south or southwest of the Hawaiian Islands in a couple of days.
- Some gradual development is possible thereafter.
- Moving slowly and erratically.
- Formation chance – 48 hours: Low (near 0%); 7 days: Low (20%)

Hurricane Karina (CAT 4)

- Located about 1020 miles WSW of the southern tip of Baja California.
- Maximum sustained winds at 145 mph.
- Karina is moving toward the west near 9 mph, and this motion is expected to continue through Monday.
- A turn toward the west-northwest is forecast to begin on Tuesday.
- Additional strengthening is possible on Monday, followed by fluctuations in intensity through the middle part of this week.
